
#### What next?



### **SYO Tour to the Czech Republic**

This tour was a real success and I don't think I heard a single complaint. No, wrong! – There were some guite strange meatball things floating in the soup one evening which provoked some adverse comment......That was the limit of the grumbling.

About the most difficult thing we had to manage was getting through the security at a very busy Heathrow. We all made it through the scans and were on board and on our way. Ready to meet us in Prague was our delightful host Marketa. She had spent much time and thought in making this tour run smoothly, and throughout our stay, she was always one step ahead checking that everything was ready for SYO to arrive. The first hotel was in Prague and the second in Plzen (Pilsen to us). Both were really good and many were perfectly happy in Prague, not particularly wanting to move – until they saw the hotel in Plzen which had the wow factor with enormous rooms, terrace and lovely swimming pool.

This was an intense tour with a concert on each of the four full days as well as much sightseeing as we could cram in. There were two half days in Prague covering a walking tour from the castle and Cathedral down to the old town, and then another exploring the old town. On the first of these days we then took a coach up into the mountains to the north of Prague to a town called Jablonec which has a beautiful theatre often used for opera performances. It has been restored to its former Austro-Hungarian glory and was a lovely venue. Here Sikun Chen gave the first of his performances as soloist in the Grieg piano concerto, and we as an orchestra began to notice how much audiences loved it when we played Czech music. Our second concert was in the Czech Museum of Music in the centre of Prague. This is an old, very high building with galleries around an open space. It has served many purposes in its history but today houses a collection of historical orchestral instruments and keyboards. We took time out to visit. Thanks to our concert being part of a concert series, we had a very good audience (including some SYO parents who had come out for a weekend break!). In this concert Mike Huang was the soloist in the Elgar cello concerto, and in that resonant acoustic, his soulful playing was very emotional. Vltava by Smetana, in the second half of the concert, moved an audience member to tears (in a good way). 'Job done' said Barnaby! That day was rounded off with a dinner cruise on the actual VItava River enjoying good company and the sight of the city all lit up. Beautiful.



The next day we checked out of the hotel in Prague and drove a couple of hours to visit the pretty spa town of Mariánské Lázne. Here, in the hills, there is a central park surrounded by villas, hotels and spas. It was a beautiful day and we enjoyed a picnic and then were enthralled with the so-called 'singing fountain' which plays music every other hour on the hour. Briefed by Marketa, we were ready to play our concert immediately the fountain had finished in the evening, so the crowd that had gathered there moved along to the 'bandstand' and stayed to listen to us. Over a hundred stood there for about an hour while we regaled them with Slavonic Dances and the inevitable VItava. By this time the whole orchestra was looking to see if we'd managed to make anyone cry!



Afterwards we drove back about an hour to Plzen and checked into the (posh) hotel. Evidently this is a business hotel for most of the year, but in the summer, with no conferences, the room rates plummet. In the morning we were lucky to enjoy some leisure time in the sunshine by the swimming pool with our lifeguard, Lucy Anderson and other staff firmly in charge. Juri, Iveta, Sue, Peter and I went shopping and were able to serve another picnic lunch by the pool.

Now it was time to go to the Mestanska Beseda concert hall, another beautiful Austro-Hungarian type building which reminded me of the style of the Musikverein in Vienna. In all my years of SYO tours. I have never been anywhere before where staff were provided to unload the van and haul the heavy instruments up the stairs. The weather turned thundery, but that didn't stop us getting a really good audience who loved Sikun's second performance of the

Grieg piano concerto, were enthusiastic about our English music and thrilled that we played Czech music to them. It was a fitting last tour performance.

Massive thanks are due to all the tour staff – Sue Edmonds, Paul Swindale, Jon Visanji, Juri Papay, Iveta Papayova, Lucy Anderson and especially to Peter Gosney and Roger Munford who packed and drove the instrument van half way across Europe.

Finally - to SYO who really cared about the quality of the music they played, were great ambassadors for Southampton and were also wonderful fun to be with. Thank you very much. Jane Higgins
