## Some Funding by the Friends

The Friends were lucky enough to receive a £15,000 donation in the autumn and the committee has been considering how best to use this money in support of the Orchestras. In spite of all the uncertainty about funding we think that the biggest threat to the continuation of the youth orchestras is the shortage of string players coming through from the primary schools. We need about 10 violin players per year leaving primary school at grade 4 standard and a further 10 at grade 3 and at the moment we're not getting them in those numbers. In consultation with Southampton Music Services we have agreed to fund a term's membership of Acorn strings, in the hope that this will encourage a few more to join and to keep progressing. We are also trying out some extra funding for schools where there is at least some interest in producing string players. There's provision through the In2music programme for people to start, but with this extra funding we hope that a few more people can be fast tracked so that they reach a higher, and to them more satisfying, standard before leaving primary school.


